STARSHIP GIVES HOPE FOR A BRIGHTER FUTURE

Jaden's story

"When I was 10 hours old, I was admitted into Starship Hospital. At two days of age I underwent two major surgeries. Within three weeks I had two further surgeries. That was 15 years ago. Since that time, I have had countless procedures, many hospital stays, and 30 major surgeries."

I was born with spina bifida and VATER association, resulting in many different medical conditions including lower limb paralysis, hydrocephalus, kidney malformations, just to name a few! I have several amazing surgical teams at Starship within Neurosurgery, Orthopaedic, Urology and General Surgery.

While I have spent a lot of time in Starship due to my conditions, it has not stopped me from living a full and rewarding life. I am currently in Year 12 at school, on two school leadership committees, a community ambassador for two nationwide charities, and I am a para-athlete. Sport is my life, and from an early age I have been active, giving anything a go. I was a competitive swimmer for a number of years, a triathlete, a wheelchair basketball player and more recently I have taken up wheelchair racing and currently hold national titles and NZ records in several track events. My dream is to represent NZ at the Paralympics in the future.

With more planned surgeries, my life at Starship is not yet over, but I know, just like everything else I will get through it. The incredible nurses, surgeons, therapists, radiologists, and other key people that work at Starship who I have come to know, are truly amazing. They look beyond my disability and see me as a person who has so much potential in life and their care and approach to my health issues is reflected in that attitude. I am lucky for what Starship has done for me.





As we head into the second year of our transformation and growth journey, we are both extremely proud of the difference the Starship Foundation has not only made in 2019, but also for the ground work undertaken for our most critical long term advancements. All of this has been possible because of you, our generous supporters. We cannot thank you enough.

Our mission to give our children, better health and brighter futures remains our guiding light and is evident with the heart-warming stories of Harry, Jaden, Ava and Hailey that feature in this report. As a result of the generosity of so many individuals,

families, trusts, foundations, community groups and corporate partners, we've been able to invest in and fund projects that have stayed true to this purpose.

It has been your support that has led to another tremendous year with double digit income growth, enabling us to dedicate over \$9 million towards impact programs. A particular highlight was the \$1.5 million commitment from the Lindsay Foundation to contribute to the Starship National Air Ambulance Service for the next three years. Your support in 2019 also gave us the confidence to actively progress early lead work on the future of our national children's hospital and its services.

We have been working with Starship leadership and the government to plan for the future. Plans which include increasing the capacity of this country's only dedicated children's intensive care unit, creating a new medical day stay unit, better facilities for families and caregivers, as well as an education space.

In order to sustain and accelerate our world-class health care, retain and attract the world's best clinicians here in New Zealand we have begun the foundation work for a Starship children's health research and innovation centre. This has been made possible through a compassionate donor bequest.

At the Starship Foundation, we have the privileged role of weaving the people together guided by the māori whakatauki of whiria te tāngata. We weave together our skilled clinicians, courageous families, and compassionate donors to accelerate world-class health for the nation through impact programs.

Programs which focus on equity to ensure no child is left behind, and prevention to keep our children safe and healthy in the community. We invest in programs which save and extend lives, and we support child wellbeing and whānau to make the tough times more bearable.

In 2019 significant impact investments have been made to upgrade Outpatients, Day Stay and our MRI. Efforts to keep our children out of hospital continue with collaborations with the Healthy Homes Initiative and SafeKids Aotearoa. Investments into maintaining excellence continue with clinical pathways, play specialists, neuropsychology services and simulation training.

And finally, to remain best in class, we continue to work towards our ambitious goal of raising \$20 million per annum by 2023. In 2020, we will embark on the largest fundraising project in the Foundation's history to support our \$15 million pledge to expand PICU, our national children's ICU.

We humbly thank you for your continued support. Ngā mihi ki a koutou.

Children come to Starship from across New Zealand. For many critically ill or injured children the only way

to get access to life-saving treatment is by air. The Foundation continues to raise funds to keep the National Air Ambulance flying.

These are three completely different kinds of support donors to the Starship Foundation fund. Each one of them really making a difference to the health and wellbeing of children across New Zealand.

A world-class facility with child-centred care improves the journey to better health for our sick and injured children. Together, we are helping make the unbearable more bearable.

Whānau coming to Starship are experiencing some of life's toughest challenges, with their child needing care from New Zealand's paediatric experts. We want to make their journey as bearable as possible and with your support in 2019 we were able to ensure the environment at Starship is world-class and the care is wrap around.

When we asked for support to expand **Starship's Play Specialist Service** last year the response from you was overwhelming. As a result Starship's Emergency Department now has Play Specialist support for seven days a week and in Radiology – where our children have scans and imaging done – Play Specialist support is demonstrating its incredible value.

In a 14 month period 132 of the 136 children referred to the dedicated radiology play specialist Shannon loane, managed their scan while awake. Previously, these children would have had a general anaesthetic.

Starship's Outpatients and Day Stay

Departments were both transformed in 2019 improving the experience not just for families, but also for the wonderful staff who provide their care and treatment.

The \$3.8 million upgrade to Outpatients, made possible by Starship Five Star Partner Mercury and their customers, is designed to meet the needs of New Zealand's growing population.

Patient capacity has increased, flow and care is more efficient and the bright, modern space is now more child and whānau-centric. An augmented reality experience now helps to calm and soothe children while they wait for appointments with one of Starship's specialist teams.

The best environment for Hailey and other Starship children

A better experience at a tough time

Hailey was three when she was diagnosed with bronchiectasis and has faced years of hospital admissions for treatment and procedures. Every day she has medicine and chest physiotherapy, and her damaged lungs are prone to infection.

More recently Hailey and her family learned that another rare disease, called Idiopathic Pulmonary Hemosiderosis, was also affecting her lungs and she has many days and nights in hospital under the care of Starship's rheumatology and respiratory teams.

Hailey's Mum, Jasmine says that Hailey is incredibly strong and positive. She says, "We are truly grateful for Starship and our care teams who are helping Hailey to live the best life possible."

Now 8 years old, regular check-ups and monitoring are crucial for Hailey and she visits the Starship

Outpatients Department four times each year.

She's just one of thousands of children who come to our Outpatients where around 300 appointments happen every weekday. Now, thanks to the generosity of Five Star Partner Mercury and their customers, these families are welcomed into, and cared for in a wonderful, fresh new space after the transformational \$3.8 million upgrade completed in 2019.

Patient care has been enhanced, clinics run more efficiently and technology is now used to help children stay calm and entertained with an interactive augmented reality experience featuring a wonderful virtual forest scene.

It all makes for a better experience for children and whānau facing tough times.

Together we help Starship keep pace with the latest technology and treatments, and to attract and retain the best and brightest staff. So our children are given the best chance to get back to living life.



More than 2000 children need an MRI at Starship each year including our infants and young people with the most complex medical conditions. So we're delighted that Starship's magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) machine got a \$910,000 upgrade in 2019. Because our brilliant staff now have the latest technology, and our children will continue to receive the absolute best care possible.

"We can scan children in less time and with less noise, and the images are better than ever before. It allows us to detect and monitor disease in ways that we previously couldn't," says the very grateful David Perry, Paediatric Radiologist at Starship.

The Douglas Starship Simulation Training Programme continues to go from strength to strength. In 2019, the team up-skilled more clinicians in simulation training than ever before through the Introduction to Simulation courses and Faculty Development Workshops. Participants come from across New Zealand and receive on-going outreach support, with active collaborations to advance local simulation programmes in the likes of Nelson, Whangarei and Hawkes Bay.

Cerebral palsy is the most common cause of childhood physical disability and can lead to disturbances in motor development, communication, eyesight, hearing, epilepsy and secondary musculo-skeletal deformities. Recipient of the **Athlae Lyon Starship Research Award**

for 2019, Starship's Dr Sue Stott is doing amazing things to improve the lives of our children living with cerebral palsy. With greater knowledge, care and treatment for these children is moving towards earlier interventions. Dr Stott's goal is to empower caregivers and health professionals across New Zealand with the latest information.

World-class MRI for Ava's fight against brain tumour

Better outcomes for our children

Late in 2019 Alex Stoneham heard news that no parent ever expects to hear.

Her twins, Isabella and Ava, were ten at the time. Close friends, a school teacher, and Alex had noticed that the usually sociable, sporty and energetic young Ava wanted to stay home all the time, and had lost her appetite and her energy.

Blood tests were normal, but then one Saturday morning Ava began vomiting. Seeking medical help this time led them to Starship and a few hours later, after a scan, Ava was diagnosed with a brain tumour.

"Since that night our journey with Starship started, Ava has had two surgeries to remove the tumour and is also now on a lifetime of medicine to help with hormones damaged by the tumour." MRI imaging is crucial for Ava's care and treatment, and she's had MRI scans at Starship, all using the latest technology thanks to the MRI upgrade made possible by you.

Paediatric Radiologist David Perry explains; "With clearer and more detailed images we can diagnose disease and monitor the effects of treatment with greater accuracy and certainty."

"The upgrade to our equipment has a positive impact for each and every child we see."

"We are very grateful to Starship supporters for making this possible sooner than it might otherwise have been."

More children are getting to their appointments at Starship since a new process for scheduling outpatients visits started in June 2019. Leaders of the Patient Focussed Booking pilot are seeing that giving the parent or caregiver more choice about their appointment date and time is both improving the experience for whānau and reducing the rates of non-attendance.

Your support has helped fast-track the trial of this new system which is proving a great success in services such as Endocrinology, Diabetes and Respiratory where non-attendance and rescheduling rates were highest.

Technology is being used to connect young people in Starship with their home or classroom through virtual reality in the **Patience Project** which launched in 2019.



EQUITY — SO NO CHILD IS LEFT BEHIND

Harry's flight on Starship's National Air Ambulance



Baby Harry was transferred to Starship's Newborn Intensive Care Unit just five days after being born. Something was wrong and he had to be resuscitated multiple times a day at Tauranga Hospital.

His condition (suspected congenital myasthenia) is rare and unique, and at times terrifying for his parents Natasha and Ben. He has regular episodes of sudden respiratory arrest – which means he can't breathe and needs immediate help.

In March of 2019 Harry had a tube inserted into his neck at Starship – a tracheostomy – so when an episode happens his parents can help him quickly, using a portable ventilator. It's meant that the Ward family were able to take Harry home to Tauranga, and they've been delighted to give their boy some normal childhood experiences like trips to the beach and the park.

But when baby Harry accidentally dislodged the tracheostomy tube he needed to get from Tauranga to Starship urgently and safely. When the call came in, the Starship National Air Ambulance was in the air quickly to collect Harry.

Children from right around New Zealand need Starship's help urgently and without warning. The Starship National Air Ambulance is ready to go at a moment's notice, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, every day of the year. Regardless of where the child is, they get access to the world-class healthcare they need and deserve.

Thankfully Harry is now back in Tauranga with a breathing tube safely reinserted. He hasn't had to take another flight since November 2019.

In 2019 the Lindsay Foundation generously pledged to donate \$1.5 million over three years to cover one third of what's needed each year to keep the Starship National Air Ambulance flying.

"My youngest daughter has suffered from severe asthma for most of her life and last year was admitted to Starship with pneumonia. Since having the curtains installed she hasn't been back to hospital. Winter was always a scary time for us, but this winter I know our house will be warmer and I don't feel scared."

At least one child dies each week in New Zealand from injuries that could have been prevented. Last year more than 7,000 children had to spend 24 hours or more in hospital being treated for preventable, traumatic injury. SafeKids Aotearoa works hard to change those confronting statistics and with your support, we're helping them do this in innovative new ways.

Using training, events, print, video and social media the team at SafeKids Aotearoa reached hundreds of thousands of New Zealand whānau in 2019 with advice on how to keep our children safe from common injuries like burns and scalds, driveway runovers, preventable poisonings and more.

Late in the year an exciting pilot programme got underway trialling the use of **personal insulin pumps in children living with diabetes** who don't meet Pharmac's current criteria to have this equipment funded.

The pilot, which involves five children, has already positively changed the lives of participants and

holds great promise for even wider impact across New Zealand. The goal is to verify that access to this equipment will help our children living with diabetes to manage their condition better at home and ultimately reduce hospital visits.

By supporting Noho Āhuru's **Healthy Homes**Initiative we are committed to making a difference for the whānau of around 15,000 vulnerable infants and children who are admitted to Starship every year with illnesses related to poverty and cold, damp homes. Having a warmer, drier and healthier home can prevent admissions to hospital for these children and together, we're making that happen.

Well fitted curtains are key with up to 30% of heat lost through windows. So, through 2019, the Habitat Curtain Bank, supported by Mercury, installed 885 curtains for 82 whānau referred because their children were suffering. Looking ahead we will support and advocate for a change in the Healthy Homes Guarantee Act to make curtains mandatory in rental properties to help keep our children well.

PREVENTION

Helping keep our children out of hospital

Every week 140 children are admitted to hospital with traumatic injuries from burns, driveway run-overs, poisoning and other common, preventable injuries.

With our support, Safekids Aotearoa is working hard to change this and to keep our children out of hospital and safe at home, at play and on the road.

More than 260 children were admitted to hospital in recent years for an unintentional burn injury. However, when comparing ethnicity data to European children, Māori and Pacific children are three times more likely to suffer a burn-related injury.


These inequities are consistent across all injury categories. That's why Safekids Aotearoa has a key area of focus in improving the unintentional injury inequities that exist for Māori tamariki and Pacific children.

And they've adapted their approach and adopted culturally relevant ways of developing and conveying injury prevention information.

"We're bringing kaupapa Māori and cultural methodologies to everything we do in that space, for example involving whānau from the start, helping to create and to tell the safety message in forms they recognise and resonate with," says director of Safekids Aotearoa, Melissa Wilson.

The impact of injury prevention work can be seen in the burns data for the population at large between 2009 and 2018. While the rate of hospital admissions for childhood burns in total decreased by 26 per cent, Māori and Pacific children remain three times more likely to suffer from adverse preventable injuries. All the more reason why, Safekids says, our children need this urgent, innovative and collaborative response.










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for Starship and My Birthday for Starship, Carmen generously and willingly shares their Starship story to help inspire support from others.

The Starship Foundation is facing one of our most critical fundraising challenges since Starship opened in 1991 and thanks to you, we're underway.

Right now we simply need more space to ensure our sickest and most fragile babies and children get the care and treatment they need.

At the Starship Foundation, we've been working with Starship leadership and the government to plan for the future. Plans which include creating a new medical day stay unit, better facilities for families and caregivers, an education space, as well as increasing the capacity of this country's only dedicated children's intensive care unit.

We're determined to make these ambitious and critical plans a reality as soon as possible and with the help of a group of key foundational supporters we ended 2019 having already raised \$1.5 million. Your early support is so important and it has put us in good shape.





"This year we celebrated the opening of the upgraded Outpatients Department that was largely funded by our amazing customers. It's been wonderful seeing this project come to life and being able to fund this world-class facility has been a privilege."

This year, alongside over 22,000 Mercury customers, we've donated over \$910,000 to Starship. As well as the Outpatients refurbishment, our customers have

helped Starship to deliver even more special projects, including the Script for Paediatrics app.

Script makes prescribing antibiotics for children smarter and more efficient, by bringing over 250 separate guidelines together to map a path for practitioners to identify the correct antibiotic and treatment plan.

Since its launch in March, the app has been downloaded over 2,700 times and the result has been a significant improvement in the appropriate prescription of antibiotics.

We've also continued to fund the continued expanded neuropsychology services and the interactive Starship 360 Experience, which support the psychological wellbeing of patients.

We've been a Five Star Partner since 2001 and have raised over \$12 million with our customers since then. It's a wonderful demonstration of the power of collective giving.
