You might remember reading the twin sisters' heart-wrenching story in a letter we sent recently.

Born prematurely, the girls spent their first month of life in neonatal intensive care. Their start was already fragile, but when they caught the respiratory virus RSV, things became truly life-threatening. Within hours, the virus overwhelmed their tiny lungs. They were fighting for every breath, and for their lives. Their terrified parents rushed them to Starship.

Starship's dedicated team of specialists was ready It started with the specialist team of doctors and nurses in Starship's Emergency Department, who took immediate action to stabilise their breathing.

It continued for the next seven days in Ward 25, as Lottie and Frankie continued to receive the specialised support that they needed to get well enough to go home.

Thanks to these extraordinary teams, and to generous supporters like you who help make their work possible, Lottie and Frankie got the care they needed to recover.

"I'm 100% sure they wouldn't be alive today without the amazing Starship team." their mum Anna says

Today, the twins are happy, healthy and back home with their family.

"They're now 2 years old," Anna says. "They love being outside - riding their bikes, swinging and going down slides, and playing with their cousins."

I hope Lottie and Frankie's story inspires you to help other critically ill children and their families breathe easier.

"We benefitted from having this amazing service when our son needed heart surgery," Fiona says. We are thankful we still have Ezekiel with us due to those services."



Thanks to you, more kids are receiving timely treatment

This June, Starship was delighted to open the new Athlae Lyon Day Stay Unit, part of the \$48 million expansion of the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU).



Consisting of six new treatment bays and two new treatment rooms, the Day Stay Unit will increase capacity and improve patient experiences at the hospital by allowing children and whānau to access timely treatment without needing to stay overnight.

"It will free up more inpatient beds for acute and planned care that requires an overnight stay," explains Dr John Beca, Starship Director.

The Day Stay Unit was named in honour of longstanding Starship supporter, Athlae Lyon, a beloved champion for children's health, whose 14 years of service left a lasting imprint.

Athlae was the inaugural Vice Chair of Friends of Starship and served as a Trustee of Starship Foundation for 18 years, passionately advocating for the hospital and its little patients. After her passing in 2010, the Lyon family founded the Athlae Lyon Starship Research Trust (ALSRT), which has contributed more than \$4 million towards the Day Stay Unit and vital clinical research. Athlae's husband Cliff says his family is inspired to know her work will live on.

"Athlae gave so much of herself to Starship – her time, her voice, her heart. Knowing her legacy now lives on in a place that helps children every day is something we're immensely proud of."

These children often struggle to sit, stand, or walk safely on their own due

to weak muscles and poor coordination. Tumble Forms provide secure, supported seating so little ones can eat, play and interact safely. The Totstander helps children



learn to bear weight through their legs, vital for bone and muscle development, by gently bringing them into a standing position.

This equipment helps therapists deliver care that prevents complications, builds independence, and improves long-term quality of life.

Mercury going above and beyond for children with inherited metabolic diseases

Starship thanks our Five Star partner Mercury for helping to improve the health and wellbeing of children with inherited metabolic diseases (IMDs).

IMDs are genetic conditions that often result in a patient being unable to produce or process specific enzymes or proteins which are vital to regular bodily functions. These conditions are typically lifelong and incurable.

To support children like James and their families, Mercury is funding a part-time Metabolic Dietician for the next two

years to provide education around lifestyle, medication and diet. One of the many projects Mercury is funding this year.

Soon after he was born. doctors discovered James had a rare metabolic disorder that affected how he processed fats. Starship's Metabolic Team started working with him straight away.

"We feel incredibly lucky that James was put under their care," his mum Molly says. "They instantly put us at ease. They were, and still are, our own personal superheroes."



A legacy that will last for generations

As Paediatric Heptologist and Service Clinical Director here at Starship, Dr Helen Evans has been caring for children facing life threatening liver diseases for nearly two decades.

In that time, she's met some remarkable patients and families, and it was her work with them that inspired her to include a gift in her Will to Starship.
