

Appendix A(i). Assessment

's care plan

- This first section provides the baseline essential information for nurses. It covers all current and relevant history.
- It is appropriate to ask about past medical history and check if the tamariki, rangatahi or whānau know who their consultant is and if they have other health teams involved.
- Use discretion when asking about Te Wa Aroha (palliative care plan). In many instances it may be obvious that the answer is no. However if there is any possibility that this might be relevant to the tamariki and whānau it can be asked as "Do the words Te Wa Aroha mean anything to you?"
